# Launching Conference

2-3 May 2019 Amman, Jordan

On January 1st 2019 EuroMed Feminist Initiative with consortium of women's rights organizations from Algeria, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Morocco, Palestine and Tunisia started implementing a regional project "Combating Violence against Women in the Southern Mediterranean Region" funded by the EU. The overall objective is to contribute to the elimination of all forms of VAWG by promoting a social environment that does not tolerate VAWG, and where decision makers address it as a political priority.

The Regional Campaign on Zero Tolerance for Violence against Women and Girls (VAWG) follows up and builds on the recommendations from the Gender Regional Platform (2015-2017), the Civil Society Conference Declaration, (21-22 November 2017 Cairo) and the Outcomes of National Dialogues (2018). It follows up on the 4th UfM Ministerial Declaration (November 2017, Cairo) in the field of combating all forms of Violence Against Women and Girls.

The Campaign was launched on 2-3 May 2019 in Amman during a conference that gathered 140 participants from 14 countries in the Euro-Med region. They included civil society organizations, ministries, political parties and members of parliaments, gender and legal experts, researchers and media. During the two-day conference participants shared experience and expertise on violence against women and girls, status of services for victims, legal frameworks, public awareness on VAWG, education and media. They discussed shared regional challenges, mainly the legal discrimination against women and the inadequacy of protection mechanisms for women and girls victims of violence, as well as a broad social tolerance towards VAWG that has led to the impunity for perpetrators and victim-blaming. Participants also raised priorities specific to the different national contexts and discussed strategies to encourage the societies to stand up against VAWG, demand the criminalization of all forms of VAWG, and implement such legislation when available. A strong focus was put on primary and secondary education.

### Conclusions for actions of common priority

- Encourage research and data collection on VAWG due to a major lack of statistics in all countries.
- Raise public awareness on legal discrimination against women and the need to change discriminative laws.
- Hold the perpetrators accountable, both in times of peace and during military conflicts.
- Mobilize public support to combat gender stereotypes and ensure VAWG is addressed by society and decision makers as a social and political issue.
- Enhance coordination and build capacity to improve service provision to victims and survivors of VAWG.
- Take broad measures to integrate and rehabilitate victims of military conflict.
- Spread knowledge on the situation on the ground to all social and political circles.
- Raise public awareness that shame and stigma should be on perpetrator, not on the victim.

## FOLLOW-UP REGIONAL EXPERTS ROUNDTABLES

### Regional Experts Roundtable

#### Combating Discrimination and Violence Against Women in Legislation

The Roundtable gathered legal and gender experts and researchers from Algeria, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Morocco, Palestine, Syria, Tunisia, France and Sweden, as well as representatives from the Office of the Minister of State for Economic Empowerment of Women and Youth (EEWAY) and the EU Delegation to Lebanon. The experts identified three areas for common work: annulling discrimination in family laws, improving legislation on VAWG, and annulling discrimination affecting women's economic participation and independence, notably inequality in inheritance and sexual harassment at work. It was also agreed that a consolidated paper containing an analysis of discriminatory laws and suggested activities is to be produced in participatory approach by experts.

#### Promoting Gender Equality through Education

The Roundtable gathered gender experts and experts in the field of education from Algeria, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Morocco, Palestine, Syria, Tunisia and France as well as representatives from the Ministries of Education from Jordan and Lebanon. The experts emphasized the need to revise the educational curricula and textbooks with the perspective of challenging cultural and social norms and eliminating gender stereotypes. Participants examined different gender sensitive teaching methods and agreed to develop regional guidelines and training manual to mainstream gender equality in the school curricula based on existing achievements and lessons learned.
